
Research Insights: Using PhotoVoice to Explore AmeriCorps Seniors Experiences

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BACKGROUND AND AIM

BACKGROUND: VCU and Virginia Tech are collaborating with Serve Virginia to implement a PhotoVoice project with AmeriCorps Seniors and AmeriCorps State and National service members in Virginia.



AIM: This project is using PhotoVoice, a participatory research method, to highlight the diversity of AmeriCorps Senior members and understand their varied motivations, experiences, and impact through photographs and discussions.

In Year 1, programs across 3-4 Virginia counties are being engaged. Some sites are meeting in person, others virtually.

THE PROCESS

- In Year 1, we are focusing on engaging AmeriCorps Seniors working with children and youth, including Foster Grandparent and RSVP programs.
- Project Site 1: 10 Foster
 Grandparents, aged 55-75 years
 who have been in service from 1 to 20 years.
- Service sites included public and faith-based daycares, after school programs, elementary schools, and as mail pen pals.

PROCESS:

- Participants receive digital cameras, a stipend, and training on Photovoice, photography skills, and ethics.
- Focus of pictures and common themes are generated by group discussion & photo sharing.

CHALLENGES:

- Need for meeting space hosted by site for in-person programs.
- Transportation issues requiring fewer meetings limited photos.
- Lack of experience with digital cameras

PARTICIPANT IDENTIFIED THEMES

"It Takes a Village": Participants saw themselves as part of the village that it takes to raise children in the community.

- 1. **Kids are our Future:** Participants saw their role as an opportunity to mentor kids, open their minds, and protect their well-being and future.
- 2. Inspirations for Becoming a Foster Grandparent:
 Positive experiences in childhood, love for children, desire to decrease isolation, and giving back to the community.
- 3. Foster Grandparent Self-Care: The need to practice self-care and protect volunteers' well-being after busy days in classrooms and at sites.
- 4. Experiences as Foster Grandparents: Joys, takeaways, and the impact service has on them and the children at the sites.
- 5. **Helping Teachers:** Foster Grandparent makes a difference in classrooms by assisting teachers and bringing light to the education journey.
- 6. We Need More of Us at More Sites: There is a critical need to recruit additional Foster Grandparents to reach more children and engage seniors who are currently bored at home.

OUTCOMES

Participants brought creativity, eagerness, and curiosity to the project.

- Produced a "Grandparents Give Back" Video Slideshow.
- Identified opportunities to:
 - o Increase skills development in early childhood education to address difficult behavior and complex needs of children
 - o Increase and support for Foster Grandparent interactions and well-being

Next Steps

In Year 2, we will conduct
Photovoice at three additional sites in Virginia and develop a Photovoice training manual that will allow for scaling the project to reach program members across the state and nationally.
