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


MISSION:




A brief history of the CEV






- 2002-2015 Current Population Survey
 (CPS) Volunteering Supplement fielded annually
- 2008-2013 CPS Civic Engagement Supplement fielded annually
- 2014 National Academies of Science report recommends merging these surveys
- 2017 Launch of biennial CPS Civic Engagement and Volunteering Supplement (CEV)



The Federal Statistical System

- 100+ Government agencies and programs
- Official Statistics on economy, people, natural resources, etc.
- Timely, relevant, trusted, objective
- Informs research and policy-making



Organizational Engagement

New measure of virtual volunteering added in 2023

- · Joining organizations
- · Formally volunteering through organizations
- · Donating to charity

Engaging with Neighbors

- · Talking with neighbors
- · Informally helping neighbors
- Discussing social issues and taking collective action with neighbors

Political Engagement

- · Voting in local elections
- Donating to political campaigns or organizations
- · Attending public meetings
- Contacting elected officials



Engaging with Friends, Family, and Social Issues

- · Talking with friends and family
- · Learning about social issues through the news
- Discussing social issues with friends and family
- Posting about social issues on social media



Economic Engagement

- Values-based buying or boycotting
- Views on whether one's workplace or work contributes to the community
- Views on whether one's work is a source of pride or satisfaction
- Whether one's workplace encourages volunteering or charitable giving

- Informal helping is climbing




FORMAL VOLUNTEERING IS REBOUNDING



Formal volunteering is rebounding



National Formal Volunteering Rate, 2002-2023



In 2023, over 75.7 million people
– or 28 percent of Americans –
formally volunteered through
an organization.

These volunteers served 4.99 billion hours and contributed over \$167.2 billion in economic value.



Economic value calculated as total hours volunteered in the previous year multiplied by <u>Independent Sector's estimate</u> of the average value of a volunteer hour in America in 2023 (\$33.49).

The nation's volunteering rate increased 5 points in two years

National Formal Volunteering Rate, 2017-2023








Rebounds are unequally distributed by geography




Comparison of State-Level Formal Volunteering Rate, Pre- and Post-Pandemic










One in five formal volunteers in America are virtual or hybrid

Who are virtual and hybrid volunteers?




Compared to those who serve completely in person, virtual and hybrid volunteers ...

- Serve more hours per year
- Are slightly older
- Are more likely to live with a disability
- Have more education
- Are more likely to informally help their neighbors, belong to organizations, and give to charity



National Rates of Talking with Neighbors, Friends, and Family a Few Times a Week or More, 2017-2023






INFORMAL HELPING IS CLIMBING



Informal helping is climbing



Frequency of Informal Helping, 2017-2023



In 2023, over 137.5 million people
– or 54 percent of Americans –
helped their neighbors informally.

This 3 percentage point increase since 2021 translates into 12.9 million more informal helpers.





Informal helping is more prevalent post-pandemic in 38 states
