Key Terms

- 1. Focus Area: One of a set of six core priority issue areas identified in the Serve America Act where AmeriCorps focuses national service and measures its impact.
- 2. Geographic Service Area: The counties in which volunteer stations are located and services are provided.
- 3. Service Activity: The service performed by AmeriCorps Seniors volunteers that supports an identified community need and aligns with AmeriCorps Seniors funding priorities and focus areas.
- 4. Sponsor: A public agency or private non-profit organization, either secular or faith-based, that receives AmeriCorps Seniors program funding and is legally responsible for stewarding grant funds. Also referred to as grantees.
- 5. Volunteer Station: A public agency, secular or faith-based private non-profit organization, or proprietary health care organization that accepts the responsibility for assignment and supervision of AmeriCorps Seniors volunteers.

- Provide support and resources to help older adults live independently and provide support and respite to caregivers of older adults





Funding Priorities


Primary Focus Areas and Funding Priorities

- Organizations leading service in communities with concentrated poverty, rural communities, tribal communities, and those organizations serving historically underrepresented and underserved individuals, including but not limited to communities of color, immigrants and refugees, people with disabilities, people who identify as part of the LGBTQIA+ community, and religious minorities.
- Projects that propose to serve states listed in Appendix A: Priority States and Territories.
- Organizations that serve people with arrest and conviction records and provide meaningful reentry opportunities.
- Programs that support civic bridgebuilding projects (meaning projects that foster respect among diverse communities, strengthen relationships across lines of difference, forge a sense of common civic purpose, and seek to solve a community program and diminish polarization) and provide training in civic bridgebuilding skills and techniques to AmeriCorps Seniors volunteers.

Foster Grandparent Program Funding Priorities

Primary Focus Areas and Funding Priorities



- Programs focused on early learning and those that prepare AmeriCorps Seniors volunteers to enter early learning careers.
- Efforts to help local communities continue to recover from the COVID-19 Pandemic through focused education efforts to address learning loss.

Senior Companion Program Funding Priorities





Primary Focus Areas and Funding Priorities

Projects that propose to raise public awareness about the challenges and needs of family caregivers and the role of older adult volunteers. Innovative service projects that can be executed by older adults will be given priority consideration. These projects can include those that:

- Advance partnerships that promote greater engagement for older adult support for family caregivers.
- Optimize well-being of family caregivers by strengthening services and supports, i.e., services to help caregivers manage their own health/emotions/physical stress, helping to find and secure other trustworthy/affordable services or supports, and those that prevent caregiver isolation.
- Develop volunteer roles that integrate older adults as volunteers who serve as part of a care coordination for clients and ongoing support for family and other caregivers.
- Develop interventions where elders can support caregivers in tribal communities.
- Spur innovations that engage older adults in intergenerational activities that help increase access to information and services for caregivers.

Community Needs Assessment

Communities are typically defined by a geographic area, but they can also be based on shared interests or characteristics such as religion, race, age, or occupation.



What is a Community Needs Assessment?

Community Needs Assessment

A Community Needs Assessment is the *intentional process* that you can take to better understand your community, including how you can have the greatest impact.

Community need can be looked at as the gap between **what is** and what should be.

Examples of Community Needs



Community Needs Assessment

Foster Grandparent Program 👮



- County has the state's lowest percentile for poverty and academic performance.
- Underserved population of youth at local juvenile detention facility
- Need for academic reinforcement and mentorship

Senior Companion Program



- Limited access to healthcare supports for older adults
- Increased number of older adults who are homebound due to lack of transportation
- 15% increase of caregivers of homebound clients
- High level of stress navigating complex health care systems

Community Asset Mapping



What is community asset mapping?

A systematic process of cataloging key services, benefits, and resources within the community (e.g., individuals, public and private organizational resources, public institutions and services, physical resources, and information organizations and influence).

Why do you need a community asset map?


- Identify community assets and strengths.
- Ensure activities are relevant to community needs.
- Obtain buy-in from the community.




