

## National Service in Oklahoma



#### MEETING COMMUNITY NEEDS IN OKLAHOMA

More than 9,600 people of all ages and backgrounds are helping to meet local needs, strengthen communities, and increase civic engagement through national service in Oklahoma. Serving at more than 1,000 locations throughout the state, these citizens tutor and mentor children, support veterans and military families, provide health services, restore the environment, respond to disasters, increase economic opportunity, and recruit and manage volunteers.

This year, the Corporation for National and Community Service (CNCS) will commit more than \$11,530,000 to support Oklahoma communities through national service initiatives. CNCS invests in cost-effective community solutions--working hand in hand with local partners to improve lives, expand economic opportunity, and engage citizens in solving problems in their communities. Serving in many of the state's most impoverished communities, CNCS provides vital support to schools, food banks, homeless shelters, community health clinics, youth centers, veterans service facilities, and other nonprofit and faith-based organizations at a time of growing demand for services. Through a unique public-private partnership, this federal investment will leverage an additional \$5,680,000 in other resources to strengthen community impact, build local support, and increase return on taxpayer dollars.

AmeriCorps: This year AmeriCorps will provide more than 900 individuals the opportunity to provide intensive, results-driven service to meet education, environmental, health, economic, and other pressing needs in communities across Oklahoma. Most AmeriCorps grant funding goes to the Oklahoma Community Service Commission, which in turn awards grants to nonprofit groups to respond to local needs. Most of the remainder of the grant funding is distributed by CNCS directly to multi-state and national organizations through a competitive grants process. Other individuals serve through AmeriCorps VISTA, whose members help bring individuals and communities out of poverty by serving full-time to fight illiteracy, improve health services, create businesses, and increase housing opportunities, and AmeriCorps NCCC (National Civilian Community Corps), a 10-month, full time residential program for men and women between the ages of 18 and 24. In exchange for their service, AmeriCorps members earn an education award that can be used to pay for college or to pay back qualified student loans. Since 1994, more than 10,000 Oklahoma residents have served more than 12 million hours and have qualified for Segal AmeriCorps Education Awards totaling more than \$22,900,000.

Senior Corps: More than 8,700 seniors in Oklahoma contribute their time and talents in one of three Senior Corps programs. Foster Grandparents serve one-on-one as tutors and mentors to more than 2,600 young people who have special needs. Senior Companions help more than 750 homebound seniors and other adults maintain independence in their own homes. RSVP volunteers conduct safety patrols, renovate homes, protect the environment, tutor and mentor youth, respond to natural disasters, and provide other services through more than 720 groups across Oklahoma.

Social Innovation Fund: The Social Innovation Fund transforms lives and communities using limited federal investment as a catalyst to grow the impact of nonprofits with evidence of strong results. It harnesses the expertise of grantmaking intermediaries to identify, evaluate and expand effective nonprofits and engages funding partners to contribute nearly three dollars to every one federal dollar invested. As the Social Innovation Fund network grows programs that work in Oklahoma, more people are able to overcome their most pressing challenges in the areas of economic opportunity, health, and youth development. The Social Innovation Fund is investing \$180,000 in expanding the impact of 1 nonprofit in Oklahoma.

The Corporation for National and Community Service is a federal agency that improves lives, strengthens communities, and fosters civic engagement through service and volunteering. CNCS annually engages more than five million Americans in service to meet local needs through Senior Corps, AmeriCorps, and national days of service; improves communities through the Social Innovation Fund, and leads President Obama's national call to service initiative, United We Serve. ### National Service Impact in Oklahoma



#### **AmeriCorps**

Oklahoma is one of only 14 states that does not budget for out-of-school time programs for children between the ages of 5-18. The OK Serves program places 75 AmeriCorps members at 22 nonprofit organizations and schools statewide. Member activities include the implementation of high quality programs including mentoring, tutoring, homework help, college and job preparation, nutrition and fitness education, arts, science and technology education, community gardening, character development, service learning, and prevention education to youth ages 5 through 18. Since the inception of the OK Serves program in 2004, 629 OK Serves members have impacted the lives of more than 329,000 underserved Oklahoma youth. Each program year, OK Serves surpasses outcome measurement goals indicating that youth are benefiting from program participation academically, emotionally, and behaviorally.

#### **AmeriCorps NCCC**

Oklahoma has the unfortunate distinction of having the highest incarceration rates in the nation for women and the third highest for men. The Oklahoma Kids Count 2010 Factbook estimated that 27,000 children in Oklahoma have a parent in prison. New Hope works with these children, helping them to become positive, productive, contributing members of society through resiliency and prevention programs. AmeriCorps NCCC members allow New Hope to expand its summer camp programming and serve more children. Exposure to positive role models and additional skill sets increases campers' competence in life skills and development. This past summer members supported 150 at-risk youth, inventoried and repaired 400 books, and served 780 meals.

#### **AmeriCorps VISTA**

Oklahoma administers the nationwide American Legion Auxiliary (ALA) sponsored AmeriCorps VISTA project. The ALA Call to Service Corps places VISTA members in military and veteran support organizations and civilian nonprofit organizations seeking to build and enhance their capacity to serve and mobilize veterans, military service members, and their families. Exemplary of the project's impact, two VISTA members, both U.S. veterans, managed the Macon Georgia Stand Down event for homeless veterans. The event in September 2013 served more than 500 veterans and 30 families of veterans. The VISTA members secured the commitment and successful participation of more than 200 volunteers, including a groundbreaking participation with Robins Air Force Base 78th Wing Air Base Support Group and the 116th Air National Guard, realizing a combined presence of more than 35 active duty uniformed volunteers.

#### **Senior Corps**

The 111 Senior Companion volunteers of Sunbeam Family Services, Inc. in Oklahoma and Cleveland counties provided 300,136 hours of companionship to 354 low-income seniors. The Senior Companions helped their clients move from feelings of isolation, loneliness, and fear of nursing home placement, to feelings of connectedness, belonging, and permanency while helping 95 family caregivers avoid caregiver burnout. For clients at risk of nursing home placement, 88 percent maintained placement at home. For clients with a family caregiver, 94 percent maintained their placement at home. The average annual cost per 560 clients served, inclusive of Senior Companion volunteers, is \$1,205 per year compared with the average annual cost of nursing home placement of \$47,450 per year. The Senior Companion Program produces important value for the volunteer, client, caregiver, and taxpayer.

#### **Social Innovation Fund**

The Mayor's Fund to Advance New York City and the NYC Center for Economic Opportunity (CEO) are replicating five effective anti-poverty programs originally piloted by CEO with Social Innovation Fund (SIF) support. By advancing the education, employment and financial savings of low-income adults and families, the programs combat poverty across a diverse cross-section of America. Two of the Mayor's Fund's nonprofit subgrantees are working in Oklahoma: Community Action Project of Tulsa and Madison Strategies Group. These two organizations received initial grants totaling over \$600,000, which they will match dollar-for-dollar with nonfederal funds. With these investments, they expect to serve an additional 2,060 individuals and families
