MEETING COMMUNITY NEEDS IN VERMONT

More than 2,300 people of all ages and backgrounds are helping to meet local needs, strengthen communities, and increase civic engagement through national service in Vermont. Serving at more than 380 locations throughout the state, these citizens tutor and mentor children, support veterans and military families, provide health services, restore the environment, respond to disasters, increase economic opportunity, and recruit and manage volunteers.

This year, the Corporation for National and Community Service (CNCS) will commit more than \$5,870,000 to support Vermont communities through national service initiatives. CNCS invests in cost-effective community solutions--working hand in hand with local partners to improve lives, expand economic opportunity, and engage citizens in solving problems in their communities. Serving in many of the state's most impoverished communities, CNCS provides vital support to schools, food banks, homeless shelters, community health clinics, youth centers, veterans service facilities, and other nonprofit and faith-based organizations at a time of growing demand for services. Through a unique public-private partnership, this federal investment will leverage an additional \$2,830,000 in other resources to strengthen community impact, build local support, and increase return on taxpayer dollars.

AmeriCorps: This year AmeriCorps will provide more than 300 individuals the opportunity to provide intensive, results-driven service to meet education, environmental, health, economic, and other pressing needs in communities across Vermont. Most AmeriCorps grant funding goes to the SerVermont, which in turn awards grants to nonprofit groups to respond to local needs. Most of the remainder of the grant funding is distributed by CNCS directly to multi-state and national organizations through a competitive grants process. Other individuals serve through AmeriCorps VISTA, whose members help bring individuals and communities out of poverty by serving full-time to fight illiteracy, improve health services, create businesses, and increase housing opportunities, and AmeriCorps NCCC (National Civilian Community Corps), a 10-month, full time residential program for men and women between the ages of 18 and 24. In exchange for their service. AmeriCorps members earn an education award that can be used to pay for college or to pay back qualified student loans. Since 1994, more than 4,700 Vermont residents have served more than 6.9 million hours and have qualified for Segal AmeriCorps Education Awards totaling more than \$15,940,000.

Senior Corps: More than 2,000 seniors in Vermont contribute their time and talents in one of three Senior Corps programs. Foster Grandparents serve one-on-one as tutors and mentors to more than 1,300 young people who have special needs. Senior Companions help more than 340 homebound seniors and other adults maintain independence in their own homes. RSVP volunteers conduct safety patrols, renovate homes, protect the environment, tutor and mentor youth, respond to natural disasters, and provide other services through more than 210 groups across Vermont.

Social Innovation Fund: The Social Innovation Fund transforms lives and communities using limited federal investment as a catalyst to grow the impact of nonprofits with evidence of strong results. It harnesses the expertise of grantmaking intermediaries to identify, evaluate and expand effective nonprofits and engages funding partners to contribute nearly three dollars to every one federal dollar invested. As the Social Innovation Fund network grows programs that work in Vermont, more people are able to overcome their most pressing challenges in the areas of economic opportunity, health, and youth development. The Social Innovation Fund is investing more than \$88,000 in expanding the impact of 1 nonprofit in Vermont.

The Corporation for National and Community Service is a federal agency that improves lives, strengthens communities, and fosters civic engagement through service and volunteering. CNCS annually engages more than five million Americans in service to meet local needs through Senior Corps, AmeriCorps, and national days of service; improves communities through the Social Innovation Fund, and leads President Obama's national call to service initiative, United We Serve. National Service Impact in Vermont



AmeriCorps State

There are no military bases in Vermont, and the challenges for families are magnified because they may be experiencing the stress of military life for the first time. Their communities often do not understand the stresses of deployment and reintegration Vermont Youth Development Corps AmeriCorps members have provided assistance to more than 217 individual military and veterans' family members, including 197 youth. Through Operation Military Kids, children who experience parental deployment and reintegration partake in free vacation and summer camps for military youth. AmeriCorps members provided outreach to military families and collaborated with the Vermont National Guard and local armories to reach military families and inform them of available community services and programs. They also assisted Operation Military Kids with Yellow Ribbon Reintegration efforts. Military youth participated in community-based programs supported by AmeriCorps members including nutrition, physical activity, community gardens, and healthy meals.

Through the Vermont Housing and Conservation Board AmeriCorps program, 1,278 economically disadvantaged individuals received housing placement services. More than 1,000 of these individuals were homeless or near-homeless. Seventy-six veterans received housing placement services and 383 individuals transitioned into affordable housing. Fifty-four homes were purchased with the assistance of members and 305 housing units were developed, repaired, or otherwise made available for low-income individuals.

AmeriCorps VISTA

The Vermont Youth Tomorrow AmeriCorps VISTA program, sponsored by the Washington County Youth Service Bureau Boys & Girls Club, supports VISTAs at community-based organizations, schools, and municipalities throughout the state that help low-income youth and families escape the cycle of poverty. The VISTA members increase academic success through mentoring and tutoring programs; build job skills through training and internship initiatives; promote healthy lifestyle choices through nutrition classes, physical activity programs, and community gardens; and support veteran and military families. In 2014, the team of 28 VISTA members:

- Raised more than \$443,124 through grants, fundraising, and in-kind donations
- Recruited and managed more than 1,761 community volunteers (including mentors and tutors) who gave more than 33,314 hours to their communities
- Developed programs that benefitted 375 military youth and families and provided housing and basic needs to 409 youth and adults
- Developed, enhanced, or implemented 153 program curricula or events that engaged 1,102 youth in structured physical activities.

SerVermont is the Service Commission in Vermont that promotes, supports, and recognizes volunteerism and community service statewide. SerVermont operates a statewide AmeriCorps VISTA project that fights poverty in Vermont by increasing education and job-training opportunities, creating more food-secure communities, increasing housing, and serving veterans and military families. During the program year that ended in April 2014, 22 VISTA members:

- Recruited 321 community volunteers who served 986 hours
- Developed \$46,919 of cash and \$9,741 of in-kind (non-cash) financial resources
- Implemented, developed, or enhanced 31 new systems as a result of capacity-building services including manuals, data tracking mechanisms, databases for volunteers, recruitment strategies for new programs, style guides for outreach materials, and social media pages.

AmeriCorps NCCC

The Vermont State parks requested an AmeriCorps NCCC team to help complete a 46 acre tree harvest at Fort Dummer State Park. The mission of the Vermont State Park system is to conserve and interpret on behalf of the people of Vermont their natural, cultural, historic and scenic heritage, and while so doing provide recreational opportunities and economic benefit. Prior to the NCCC team arrival, Vermont State Parks had cut down 4,600 acres of trees. When the NCCC team arrived, they cleared tree debris from the road, a picnic area, parking lot and raked off 61 campsites clear of leaves and pine needles. Members also put numbered posts into the ground to identify the campgrounds. The felling of trees and clearing of debris was done to create a sunny, dry, warm camping and picnic area. By cutting down the trees the campsites had a chance to let in more sun. Removing trees throughout the park also benefited the forest by reducing the canopy and allowing understory trees to develop.

Senior Corps Foster Grandparent Program

Last year the United Way of Chittenden County's Foster Grandparent Program volunteers devoted an average of 15 hours per week providing one-to-one intervention to 334 at-risk children in the four counties of Chittenden, Franklin, Grand Isle, and Washington. Teachers identified students needing additional support to achieve reading, math, social and behavioral goals. Of children assisted by Foster Grandparent volunteers this year, 94 percent were reported to have increased enjoyment of learning, 97 percent increased interest in learning, 95 percent increased self-confidence about learning, and 98 percent increased productivity. Even more encouraging is that 83 percent of elementary school children served by a Foster Grandparent fully achieved teacher-defined goals in reading, math, or behavioral/social domains.

National Service Impact in Vermont



Senior Corps RSVP

The RSVP Program of Rutland/Addison Counties sponsored by Rutland Community Program, Inc. engages volunteers to serve in many capacities including healthy futures, education, and other community needs. In the most recent program year, 789 RSVP volunteers served a cumulative total of 139,973 hours. RSVP volunteers had especially significant impacts working with elementary school students and seniors at-risk for osteoporosis. Ninety-seven RSVP volunteers served 873 elementary school children with 100 percent of teachers and school personnel indicating that the RSVP volunteers mad a significant impact towards educational goals, literacy goals, and/or general well-being needs of their students. A total of 286 RSVP volunteers served 952 participants in Bone Builder classes that met weekly in Rutland and Addison Counties. According to the results of the Functional Capacity Survey, 85 percent of the program participants reported an increase in strength, 82 percent reported an increase in flexibility, and 90 percent reported improved overall well-being.

Senior Corps Senior Companion Program

Central Vermont Council on Aging, sponsor of the statewide Vermont Senior Companion Program, successfully engages Senior Companion volunteers to assist other seniors to keep living independently. Last fiscal year, a total of 66 Senior Companion volunteers served 57,847 hours assisting 449 seniors statewide. Additionally, 84 clients received in-home respite care by a Senior Companion.
