MEETING COMMUNITY NEEDS IN PUERTO RICO

More than 1,600 people of all ages and backgrounds are helping to meet local needs, strengthen communities, and increase civic engagement through national service in Puerto Rico. Serving at more than 160 locations throughout the state, these citizens tutor and mentor children, support veterans and military families, provide health services, restore the environment, respond to disasters, increase economic opportunity, and recruit and manage volunteers.

This year, the Corporation for National and Community Service (CNCS) will commit more than \$8,520,000 to support Puerto Rico communities through national service initiatives. CNCS invests in cost-effective community solutions--working hand in hand with local partners to improve lives, expand economic opportunity, and engage citizens in solving problems in their communities. Serving in many of the state's most impoverished communities, CNCS provides vital support to schools, food banks, homeless shelters, community health clinics, youth centers, veterans service facilities, and other nonprofit and faith-based organizations at a time of growing demand for services. Through a unique public-private partnership, this federal investment will leverage an additional \$3,130,000 in other resources to strengthen community impact, build local support, and increase return on taxpayer dollars. Nationwide, CNCS, its grantees, and project sponsors generated more than \$1.25 billion in outside resources from businesses, foundations, public agencies, and other sources in FY 2015.

AmeriCorps: This year AmeriCorps will provide more than 300 individuals the opportunity to provide intensive, results-driven service to meet education, environmental, health, economic, and other pressing needs in communities across Puerto Rico. Most AmeriCorps grant funding goes to the Puerto Rico's Commission for Volunteerism and Community Service, which in turn awards grants to nonprofit groups to respond to local needs. Most of the remainder of the grant funding is distributed by CNCS directly to multi-state and national organizations through a competitive grants process. Other individuals serve through AmeriCorps VISTA, whose members help bring individuals and communities out of poverty by serving full-time to fight illiteracy, improve health services, create businesses, and increase housing opportunities, and AmeriCorps NCCC (National Civilian Community Corps), a 10-month, full time residential program for men and women between the ages of 18 and 24. In exchange for their service, AmeriCorps members earn an education award that can be used to pay for college or to pay back qualified student loans. Since 1994, more than 5,700 Puerto Rico residents have served more than 12 million hours and have qualified for Segal AmeriCorps Education Awards totaling more than \$17,110,000.

Senior Corps: More than 1,300 seniors in Puerto Rico contribute their time and talents in one of three Senior Corps programs. Foster Grandparents serve one-on-one as tutors and mentors to more than 3,900 young people who have special needs. Senior Companions help more than 1,200 homebound seniors and other adults maintain independence in their own homes. RSVP volunteers conduct safety patrols, renovate homes, protect the environment, tutor and mentor youth, respond to natural disasters, and provide other services through more than 11 groups across Puerto Rico.

The Corporation for National and Community Service is a federal agency that improves lives, strengthens communities, and fosters civic engagement through service and volunteering. CNCS annually engages more than five million Americans in service to meet local needs through Senior Corps, AmeriCorps, and national days of service; improves communities through the Social Innovation Fund, and leads President Obama's national call to service initiative, United We Serve. - This figure represents the number of awarded positions available to be filled in the 2015 2016 program year. For AmeriCorps VISTA, this represents the actual number of VISTA members in active service.
- This figure represents the maximum potential value of Segal AmeriCorps Education Awards that can be earned by AmeriCorps members serving in Puerto Rico. The award can be used in any state to pay for college, graduate school, vocational training, or to pay back student loans. The education award total is included in total CNCS funding.
- AmeriCorps National figures may include national programs headquartered in the state and/or operating sites of national programs that are headquartered in other states. Funding reflects the estimated proportionate share of the national grant associated with operating sites in this report. Some national organizations do not report operating site data, or it was not available at time of publishing, so figures may not reflect current conditions.
- The service location total may contain multiple counts of unique locations where multiple CNCS programs are operating.
- As part of its public-private partnership approach, CNCS requires grantees to leverage additional resources to strengthen community impact and increase the return on the federal investment. This figure reflects non-CNCS cash and in-kind resources that CNCS grantees and project sponsors have committed to raise or other revenue used to support their programming activities across the state. Last year, CNCS, its grantees, and project sponsors generated more than \$1.25 billion in outside resources from businesses, foundations, public agencies, and other sources.

National Service Impact in Puerto Rico



State Commission

The Puerto Rico Commission for Volunteerism and Community Service administer 15 AmeriCorps programs and one AmeriCorps planning grant. The AmeriCorps programs address education, health futures, safeguarding the environment, providing disaster relief, and promoting civic engagement. During 2015, Puerto Rico suffered a severe drought, especially in the Northeast of the island. The drop in water levels at the island's two main reservoirs, Lake La Plata and Lake Carraizo, required the implementation of a rationing plan for municipalities that get their water from these reservoirs. In response to this emergency, First Lady Wilma Pastrana Jimenez led an effort with the Puerto Rico State Commission for Volunteerism and Community Service, more than 100 AmeriCorps members serving with the Department of Natural and Environmental Resources, and 50 community volunteers to begin implementing a plan for reforestation of watersheds in the country. This plan included dredging Lake La Plata to reduce sediment buildup and reforestation of watersheds to prevent sedimentation of waterways. More than 200 trees of native species and fruit trees were planted in the Wildlife Refuge Reservoir at Lake La Plata. This reforestation effort is expected to decrease erosion and sediment build-up in the lake.

AmeriCorps State

The Sila M. Calderón Foundation and its Center for Puerto Rico programs offer individuals, women and community leaders the necessary training for the development and strengthening of entrepreneurial initiatives, contributing to the economic development of Puerto Rico. A total of 11 AmeriCorps members serve within the entrepreneurial training programs. Members collaborate with economically disadvantaged individuals and provide training, technical assistance, and other support for the development or strengthening of their business initiatives. The assistance offered to participants is essential for the application of the concepts discussed during workshops. With the assistance of the Center for Puerto Rico, program participant Victor Santanahe has forged links with local farmers to provide hives to aid in pollination, thus expanding the services he provides. Furthermore, he made a complete makeover of his brand, which after undergoing a marketing focus group was changed from Bee Buster Honey to the eco-friendly name of Bee Keeper Honey.

After graduating from the Capacity Building Program for the Development of Entrepreneurial/Community Initiatives in August 2015, participant Maggy Castro has slowly progressed in her desire to reinvent and promote her business idea directed towards the sales of baked goods. Ms. Castro also participated in the Entrepreneurial Impulse Program, geared towards improving and further developing graduates' business initiatives. As a result of her participation in the workshops and the support of AmeriCorps members, she developed ideas to improve her product. Through her interaction with AmeriCorps members and the technical support sessions, she realized there was a more marketable and cost-effective product she could develop.

AmeriCorps VISTA

The Chana and Samuel Levis Foundation has successfully implemented an AmeriCorps VISTA program that has led to multiple outcomes including a new volunteer program with the University of Puerto Rico, increased volunteer engagement in schools; revamping of its webpage, more exposure and visibility in social media, and new and improved curricula better aligned with the Puerto Rico Department of Education's strategy. The AmeriCorps VISTAs have also developed more comprehensive community assessment tools based on social cartography methods in at least three target schools. The work of VISTA helped create a new school-based measurement and needs assessment strategies for teacher, students, and parents at the first after-school program. The new training offerings for parents within the target schools will strengthen school ecosystem involvement.

AmeriCorps VISTA members at the San Juan Bay Estuary Program helped design several projects around the San Juan Bay area, including new strategies to overcome poverty in the communities between the San Juan Bay and the Cucharillas Wetland. The program is used by more than 1,000 fishermen and produces close to 350,000 pounds of fish annually. Members served as leaders and helped design a community and multi-sector activity to plant red mangroves in La Esperanza Peninsula, located in a beautiful area of the San Juan Bay. The community is hoping to increase fish population and diversity in order to increase work. This is one of the many strategies being designed to help improve the ecosystems of the zone and strengthen eco-tourism and fishing activities in hopes of creating more job opportunities for the communities surrounding the San Juan Bay.

Senior Corps Foster Grandparent Program

Esperanza para la Vejez Inc. currently engages 179 Foster Grandparent volunteers at 22 schools in the towns of Bayamon and Carolina. Foster Grandparents serve five hours daily. Last year, 223 Foster Grandparents were assigned to 19 elementary schools, supporting more than 281 students with tutoring, especially with reading skills. Twenty-two Foster Grandparents are serving in middle schools helping 32 students in different content areas.

Senior Corps RSVP

The Gericola Corporation RSVP program engages 145 RSVP volunteers whose services benefit many citizens, including veterans. Volunteers serve in homeless shelters and support the elderly among other duties. These services are offered at eight different stations through the municipalities of Las Piedras, Humacao, and Yabucoa, an area of more than 135,000 inhabitants.

Senior Corps Senior Companion Program

The Ombudsman Office for the Elderly is the government office responsible for serving and protecting people over sixty years old. It has sponsored the Senior Companion Program for more than twenty-five years. The organization has given a sense of purpose to active elderly population interested in serving their peers in need. Nearly 100 Senior Companion volunteers provide supportive services and companionship in the region of Arecibo, Bayamón, Carolina, Cayey, Isabela, Mayagüez, Ponce, Rio Grande, and San Juan, an area with more than 1.2 million inhabitants. As of October 2015, Senior Companions served more than 89,282 volunteer hours, impacting more than 200 clients and their families.
