MEETING COMMUNITY NEEDS IN ILLINOIS

More than 13,000 people of all ages and backgrounds are helping to meet local needs, strengthen communities, and increase civic engagement through national service in Illinois. Serving at more than 2,100 locations throughout the state, these citizens tutor and mentor children, support veterans and military families, provide health services, restore the environment, respond to disasters, increase economic opportunity, and recruit and manage volunteers.

This year, the Corporation for National and Community Service (CNCS) will commit more than \$36,260,000 to support Illinois communities through national service and social innovation initiatives. CNCS invests in cost-effective community solutions--working hand in hand with local partners to improve lives, expand economic opportunity, and engage citizens in solving problems in their communities. Serving in many of the state's most impoverished communities, CNCS provides vital support to schools, food banks, homeless shelters, community health clinics, youth centers, veterans service facilities, and other nonprofit and faith-based organizations at a time of growing demand for services. Through a unique public-private partnership, this federal investment will leverage an additional \$38,900,000 in other resources to strengthen community impact, build local support, and increase return on taxpayer dollars. Nationwide, CNCS, its grantees, and project sponsors generated more than \$1.25 billion in outside resources from businesses, foundations, public agencies, and other sources in FY 2015.

AmeriCorps: This year AmeriCorps will provide more than 2,600 individuals the opportunity to provide intensive, results-driven service to meet education, environmental, health, economic, and other pressing needs in communities across Illinois. Most AmeriCorps grant funding goes to the Serve Illinois, which in turn awards grants to nonprofit groups to respond to local needs. Most of the remainder of the grant funding is distributed by CNCS directly to multi-state and national organizations through a competitive grants process. Other individuals serve through AmeriCorps VISTA, whose members help bring individuals and communities out of poverty by serving full-time to fight hunger and illiteracy, improve health services, and increase housing opportunities, and AmeriCorps NCCC (National Civilian Community Corps), a 10-month, full time residential program for men and women between the ages of 18 and 24. In exchange for their service, AmeriCorps members earn an education award that can be used to pay for college or to pay back qualified student loans. Since 1994, more than 39,000 Illinois residents have served more than 55 million hours and have qualified for Segal AmeriCorps Education Awards totaling more than \$131,790,000.

Senior Corps: More than 11,000 seniors in Illinois contribute their time and talents in one of three Senior Corps programs. Foster Grandparents serve one-on-one as tutors and mentors to more than 3,600 young people who have special needs. Senior Companions help more than 590 homebound seniors and other adults maintain independence in their own homes. RSVP volunteers conduct safety patrols, renovate homes, protect the environment, tutor and mentor youth, respond to natural disasters, and provide other services through more than 1,400 groups across Illinois.

Social Innovation Fund: The Social Innovation Fund transforms lives and communities using limited federal investment as a catalyst to grow the impact of nonprofits with evidence of strong results. It harnesses the expertise of grantmaking intermediaries to identify, evaluate and expand effective nonprofits and engages funding partners to contribute nearly three dollars to every one federal dollar invested. As the Social Innovation Fund network grows programs that work in Illinois, more people are able to overcome their most pressing challenges in the areas of economic opportunity, health, and youth development. The Social Innovation Fund is investing more than \$460,000 in expanding the impact of 14 nonprofits in Illinois.

The Corporation for National and Community Service is a federal agency that improves lives, strengthens communities, and fosters civic engagement through service and volunteering. CNCS engages millions of Americans in service to meet local needs through Senior Corps, AmeriCorps, and national days of service; improves communities through the Social Innovation Fund, and leads volunteer initiatives across the nation. National Service Impact in Illinois



State Commission

The Serve Illinois Commission has recently formed the Illinois Disaster Corps program. Through this program, AmeriCorps members from different programs across the state will be trained on the operation of a Volunteer Reception Center. The creation of this Corps comes from years of Illinois' response needs, and a partnership with the Illinois Emergency Management Agency. This year has seen significant movement in the creation of Illinois first statewide disaster response team and it will be using AmeriCorps and Senior Corps members.

AmeriCorps State

One of the Illinois Justice Corps AmeriCorps members was staffing the courthouse law library when a distraught woman with visible injuries and a child came in, looking for help, with an Order of Protection for domestic violence. The Circuit Clerk told the woman where to find forms, but couldn't provide any other direction. Luckily, the Justice Corps member was able to step in. The member sat with the woman for about an hour and showed her how to complete the lengthy forms. Meanwhile, across the room, another member drew pictures on scrap paper with the child as a distraction while the mother described the abuse. After the forms were completed, the member walked with the woman and child to the Circuit Clerk's office to file the forms and was able to calm the woman while explaining what would happen next in the process. The member walked with her to the appropriate courtroom, and gave the woman the information for a domestic violence advocate and counselor. The Justice Corps member gave empathy and assistance to a woman and made an unbearable situation a little more manageable.

Francisco emigrated from Mexico in 1992. He lived in Chicago for 20 years and graduated from Noble Rauner College Prep in 2010, where he had been taught by many Teach For America AmeriCorps members and alumni. Francisco went on to study history at Wabash College, lead a number of campus groups, and graduate cum laude. After he graduated, Francisco joined Teach For America in Chicago and was hired to teach at Noble Hansberry College Prep — the same network where he attended high school. In year one at Hansberry, Francisco led his students to more than 1.5 years of academic growth. Now in his second year, Francisco teaches AP World History. He oversees an advisory group of 15 young men, helping them get on and stay on track to meet the school's promotion requirements, which include grades, community service, and other criteria. He is responsible for supporting these students in their college application process, and hopes that his support and teaching will create the opportunity for some of his students to do exactly what he did: excel in high school and college then come back to serve their local school community as Noble teachers.

AmeriCorps National

Chicago's HIV prevalence rate is nearly three times the national average. To address HIV in their community, 11 full time AIDS United AmeriCorps members provide direct services to Chicago residents, including HIV testing and counseling, health care access, prevention outreach, prevention education, and emotional and social services to at-risk populations. Since 2000, AIDS United AmeriCorps members in Chicago have informed more than 20,000 people of their HIV status through HIV rapid testing and counseled them on their risk behaviors. The team has reached more than 35,000 people through community outreach and education, providing information about HIV/AIDS risk reduction and connecting people to medical care. Members have also mobilized more than 1,000 volunteers in the Chicago area.

Citizen Schools is a nonprofit organization that partners with middle schools to expand the learning day for children in low-income communities. Its AmeriCorps members serve in Chicago public schools, leading real-world learning projects, providing academic support, and helping all students discover and achieve their dreams. In their two years of service, AmeriCorps members serve as Teaching Fellows, giving students months of extra learning through academic mentoring and skill-building apprenticeships that translate into college readiness and career opportunities. Citizen Schools has been recognized as a leader in engaging volunteers, generating student impact, and balancing direct service with systemic change efforts. Students who are supported by Citizen Schools graduated from high school within four years at a rate of 71 percent, compared to 59 percent among matched peers, and 61 percent of Citizen Schools' alumni enroll in college.

City Year Chicago AmeriCorps has 206 members who serve full-time at 24 schools, helping more than 15,860 students at greatest risk of dropping out. City Year AmeriCorps members work alongside teachers, using research-based tools to improve students' attendance, behavior, and performance in math and English. The members also lead afterschool programs and school-wide initiatives to improve school culture. Thanks to the members' service, 52 percent of students who had individual support and began the year with a D or F in math or English improved their grades to C or higher, and 82 percent the teachers agree that having a City Year AmeriCorps member in their classroom allows them to reach more students and meet individual student learning needs.

National Service Impact in Illinois



The Chicago Urban League has four AmeriCorps members who serve through its Healthy Living Peer Educators Program. The AmeriCorps members reach out to participants, help them enroll in health insurance, and teach preventive health education workshops. The AmeriCorps members helped more than 400 underserved residents in the Chicago area. At one community event, AmeriCorps members partnered with the Chicago Urban League's weekly Workforce Development Department Success Strategies program to teach health education workshops for youth and young adults. For Black History Month, the members designed a rich, engaging, month-long health awareness series called Black Health for Black History. The members partner every week with the American Red Cross, local physicians' offices, health food grocers, and fitness and wellness organizations to offer interactive activities for members of the community.

New Sector AmeriCorps members in the AmeriCorps RISE program complete high-impact capacity-building projects for organizations in the Chicago area that focus on education and economic opportunity. Their service helps local nonprofits with projects ranging from volunteer engagement to performance measurement and beyond, and allows the nonprofits to create, improve, or expand services to their community. In the past year, 15 New Sector AmeriCorps members completed projects to strengthen organizations that serve more than 150 "opportunity youth" and 40,000 low-income residents. The AmeriCorps members participated in up to 200 hours of training, mentorship, and coaching to strengthen their service and help them continue to serve through careers in the social impact sector.

Up2Us Sports' Coach Across America program trained and placed 25 members in Chicago in the past year. The members coached and led sports-based programming. They used mentoring and youth development skills to help young people learn life skills and improve health through sports. They served 3,445 youth — mostly minority youth from low-income families — at 11 host sites. At the end of the program, 91 percent of the youth improved in one or more positive internal attribute that contributes to healthy decision-making, and 91 percent of the youth reported that their coach was a good role model. This program is effective because it uses sports to engage under-represented populations into AmeriCorps roles and inspire in them a longer-term commitment to service. After they complete their service, half of the AmeriCorps member coaches plan to pursue careers and/or higher education in recreation or health fields.

AmeriCorps VISTA

The Illinois Institute for Rural Affairs manages a 20 member AmeriCorps VISTA project that addresses food security issues in rural communities, after-school programming for at-risk students, affordable housing, and access to social services. The Institute for Rural Affairs collaborates with seven community partners across Illinois to bring vital VISTA resources to rural communities. The Macomb Food Coop successfully reached its goal of creating a sustainable food cooperative. Over the last three years, VISTA members helped establish a food cooperative to improve access to healthy food for low-income families in the region. VISTA members identified local vendors who offered farm-to-table produce and vegetables, increased the number of low-income producers who sold their goods at the co-op; recruited and managed 500 volunteers who served 10,000 hours in 2016; created an online store that developed into a brick-and-mortar store resulting in the hiring of a full-time and part-time staff member; and managed 200 student volunteers who worked in the community garden.

Housing Action Illinois serves as an intermediary sponsor and manages 15 collaborative relationships. AmeriCorps VISTA members at HOPE Fair Housing Center assisted in writing three grants and managed a team of volunteers to lead the Dupage 5K Human Race, bringing in a total of \$88,185. At Respond Now, they helped secure grants totaling \$150,000 from Grant Healthcare Foundation and the Cook County Mortgage Foreclosure Mediation Program. At Northwest Side Housing Center, they managed special fundraising efforts including Giving Tuesday and the Annual Appeal, bringing in \$64,500.00 in cash resources. At Rockford Area Habitat for Humanity, they coordinated the annual fundraiser and leveraged \$43,050 in cash donations and \$10,000 in in-kind donations. At the Spanish Coalition for Housing, they worked on a grant proposal for JP Morgan Chase and Wells Fargo raising \$90,000 in cash resources and \$121,000 in in-kind donations. At Mercy Housing Center, they created partnerships that resulted in 47 residents being hired and created an asset map identifying MHL partners and raised \$150,000 in cash resources and \$25,000 in in-kind donations.

AmeriCorps NCCC

In service with the Forest Preserve of Cook County, an AmeriCorps NCCC team helped restore an urban forest preserve by removing invasive species in order to allow native plants to thrive. As part of its centennial initiative, the Forest Preserve has recommitted to improving the health of this land and to ensure the preserve's appearance is welcoming to visitors. The team mulched 30 acres of trees, walking trails, and educational flower and plant gardens. The team also removed 200 ash trees that were affected by the Emerald Ash Borer beetle and cleared 10 acres of land consisting of dead trees and giant branches, and removed bucked logs and limbs. Members removed about 2,000 pounds of Garlic Mustard, Burdock, Buckthorn, Honeysuckle and Burberry plants. The team's effort contributed to the restoration of the forest preserves, reestablished native plants and animals that once belonged to the area, and provided safer recreational areas for the visitors of the Forest Preserves of Cook County.

National Service Impact in Illinois



An AmeriCorps NCCC team assisted Living Lands and Water (LLW) with an Alternative Spring Break river cleanup program, planting trees and leading volunteers through the Million Tree Project. The program hosts community-based river cleanups where volunteers collect debris from shorelines and islands via work boats and barges. The project started in Memphis, TN where members helped clean up the Mississippi River during the program's event. Members collected 3,061 lbs of trash. When the team was finished helping with the event they traveled to East Moline to help with the project. The project consisted of wrapping, delivering, and handing out trees. The trees were Swamp White Oak, White Oak, Bur Oak, Red Oak, and Black Oak. During the time spent in East Moline, the team wrapped a total of 125,000 trees. Afterward, the team traveled to Peoria to hand out 8,500 trees on Earth Day. Due to the work of the team, the Mississippi River (which many communities depend on) was protected, while the tree canopy increased in multiple towns and cities.

Senior Corps Foster Grandparent Program

The Foster Grandparent Program of Menard and Sangamon County, sponsored by One Hope United, partnered with Springfield School District 186 to survey school families. When assessing the "spectrum of homelessness," the survey identified more than 1,000 children that were homeless or doubled-up at friends' houses. Studies show that children of families who are homeless are often at or below the poverty level and at risk for low academic achievement. The program matched 56 Foster Grandparent volunteers with 162 elementary students. In one school year, 97 percent of students increased their academic performance in literacy and/or math.

Senior Corps RSVP

The Western Illinois Area Agency on Aging (WIAAA)'s Retired and Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP) has served Western Illinois and Eastern lowa's Quad Cities area since 2001. For the 2015-2016 grant year, more than 770 volunteers served Illinois's Henderson, Mercer, Rock Island, Knox, and Warren Counties and Iowa's Scott County. During the year, volunteers provided 1,500 individuals with emergency food, supported 2,500 veterans, provided safety, health, and welfare programs to 800 children, and served 5,115 hours in disaster assistance and response. By collaborating with Scott County Emergency Management Agency, WIAAA's RSVP developed a successful Volunteer Reception Center. When a tornado hit Rock Island County in March 2016, RSVP activated the center. Volunteers supported local residents throughout the disaster's aftermath. This partnership served as a catalyst for additional disaster trainings throughout the sponsor's service area, and facilitated partnerships between the Scott County Health Department, local Red Cross chapter, Davenport Fire Department, Clinton County Emergency Management Agency, Quad Cities Community Organization Active in Disaster, and the Illinois Disaster Corps.

Senior Corps Senior Companion Program

Catholic Charities, Diocese of Joliet, sponsors the Senior Companion Program (SCP) for Will, Kankakee, Grundy, and Iroquois Counties. This year, more than 69 SCP volunteers helped more than 183 clients live independently in their homes, including at least 13 veterans. They also provided respite care to more than 72 caregivers. Catholic Charities partnered with the Senior Service Center of Will County, Iroquois Public Health Department, and Grundy County Health Department to support these frail and at-risk seniors. This year, 163 clients (89 percent) and 58 caregivers (80 percent) reported feeling more connected to their community and increased ability to remain living in their own home.

Social Innovation Fund

The Social Innovation Fund (SIF) transforms lives by using evidence to find what works and make it work for more people. The SIF Classic and SIF Pay for Success programs harness the expertise of grant-making intermediaries to identify, evaluate and expand effective nonprofits serving low-income communities across America. AIDS Foundation of Chicago's Connect2Care Program has maintained more than 90 percent linkage to care rate for clients enrolled since 2010. The Local Initiatives Support Corporation SIF programs are putting residents back to work, and in 2015 they helped place more than 600 people in jobs. The Social Innovation Fund is investing \$189,194 and expanding the impact of 13 nonprofits.

JARC offers bridge programming for adults who want careers in manufacturing or those who want to build careers in multiple sectors where digital literacy and customer-focused servicing skills are required. JARC offers three different contextualized bridge programs at its locations in Ravenswood and Austin, which include: Manufacturing Bride, Press Brake Bridge, and Career Management Course Bridge, which focuses on digital literacy and job readiness training. All bridge program participants receive integrated services which include income supports, employment services and a robust set of financial services and financial education. JARC believes that taking a holistic approach to integrated support services in tandem with offering high-quality career pathways training for basic skills-deficient adults is the key to becoming financially capable over the long term for individuals and their families.

Metropolitan Family Services (Metropolitan), through its Financial Opportunity Center, offers employment services, financial coaching, and income supports access on Chicago's South Side. Metropolitan will leverage the bridge programming available at Kennedy King College (KKC), supporting students with wraparound FOC services. Participants will earn a GED, gain the industry-recognized ServSafe credential, and have the opportunity to continue in KKC's degree programs and/or begin employment in a hospitality career pathway. Metropolitan's FOC and bridge program is also unique because the services are located on the campus of KKC and accessible to students as well as the broader neighborhood.

NLEN will existing Financial Opportunity Center integrated services delivery and job readiness and occupational skills training to offer a bridge programming to access sustainable-wage growth industries in Chicago. NLEN's program will prepare low-income job seekers, including citizens returning from incarceration and others with multiple barriers to employment, who have reading and math skills below the 10th grade level to enter and succeed on a career pathway in Transportation, Distribution, and Logistics. Bridge training includes job readiness, contextualized academics and career development, commercial driver's license Class B preparation, and training in rail and diesel mechanics. FOC services including career and employment coaching will support participants' success in training.

POAH will launch a new Bridges to Career Opportunities program focused on the hospitality and retail sectors. Preparation for this career pathway will consist of two contextualized course offerings, one to bring participants to a minimum of 6th grade reading and math skills, and the second from 6th to 10th grade level, providing two entry points for the program. From there, participants enter occupational skills training and secure two credentials: the ACT National Career Readiness Certificate, and the National Retail Federation Foundation's Customer Service and Sales Certificate, an industry credential for retail. In addition to the innovation of integrating bridge programming with supportive Financial Opportunity Center services, POAH's project serves an unmet need in the community in that it provides a faster track to credentials and training for individuals at or below the 6th grade reading and math levels.

Description

New Moms, Inc. supports Chicago area young moms (aged 13-24) and their children, who are experiencing poverty and homelessness, with the personal and workforce development tools they need to permanently change their life stories from chronic dependence on society, to economic independence and family stability. Since 2010, their social enterprise, Bright Endeavors, has provided workforce training and transitional jobs for these young mothers. Bright Endeavors lights the way out of poverty for young moms by teaching these strong women to craft premium soy candles in a supportive, professional environment. Through our paid transitional jobs program, we provide the guidance and job skills young moms need to secure quality employment and achieve a lifetime of personal success

The Cara Program prepares and inspires motivated individuals to break the cycles of homelessness and poverty, transform their lives, strengthen our communities, and forge paths to real and lasting success. Since 2005, The Cara Program has operated social enterprises in Chicago to provide transitional jobs for people who have faced barriers to work. Cara operates two social enterprises: CleanSlate, a community beautification and maintenance company, and TCP Staffing, a staffing agency. These enterprises provide wage-paying transitional jobs to employees who also receive coaching and supports to help stabilize their lives.

Youth Guidance serves at-risk male youth grades 7-10 (ages 12-18) in distressed Chicago neighborhoods through a promising dropout and violence prevention program, "Becoming a Man" (BAM). BAM offers inschool programming, in some cases complemented by afterschool sports, to develop social-cognitive skills strongly correlated with reductions in anti-social behavior. The in-school program currently consists of 30 voluntary one-hour small-group sessions (15 youth, maximum), conducted once a week during the school day over the course of the school year. Each session is built around a lesson designed to develop a specific skill through stories, role-playing, and group exercises, and includes a homework assignment to practice and apply that skill. The afterschool sports component reinforces conflict resolution skills and the social and emotional learning objectives of the BAM curriculum. The BAM program is an evidenced-based intervention and recently underwent a randomized controlled trial conducted by the University of Chicago Crime Lab that showed it increased school engagement, reduced arrests for both violent and nonviolent crime, and had the potential to increase high school graduation rates. With this investment, Youth Guidance will be able to serve an additional 2,420 young men through the BAM program in existing and new sites throughout Chicago.
