MEETING COMMUNITY NEEDS IN MASSACHUSETTS

More than 8,300 people of all ages and backgrounds are helping to meet local needs, strengthen communities, and increase civic engagement through national service in Massachusetts. Serving at more than 1.200 locations throughout the state, these citizens tutor and mentor children, support veterans and military families, provide health services, restore the environment, respond to disasters. increase economic opportunity, and recruit and manage volunteers.

This year, the Corporation for National and Community Service (CNCS) will commit more than \$48,530,000 to support Massachusetts communities through national service and social innovation initiatives. CNCS invests in cost-effective community solutions-working hand in hand with local partners to improve lives, expand economic opportunity, and engage citizens in solving problems in their communities. Serving in many of the state's most impoverished communities, CNCS provides vital support to schools, food banks, homeless shelters, community health clinics, youth centers, veterans service facilities, and other nonprofit and faith-based organizations at to identify, evaluate and expand effective nonprofits and a time of growing demand for services. Through a unique publicprivate partnership, this federal investment will leverage an additional \$23,790,000 in other resources to strengthen community impact, build local support, and increase return on taxpayer dollars. Nationwide, CNCS, its grantees, and project sponsors generated more than \$1.25 billion in outside resources from businesses, foundations, public agencies, and other sources in FY 2015.

AmeriCorps: This year AmeriCorps will provide more than 2,600 individuals the opportunity to provide intensive, results-driven service to meet education, environmental, health, economic, and other pressing needs in communities across Massachusetts. Most AmeriCorps grant funding goes to the Massachusetts Service Alliance, which in turn awards grants to nonprofit groups to respond to local needs. Most of the remainder of the grant funding is distributed by CNCS directly to multi-state and national organizations through a competitive grants process. Other individuals serve through AmeriCorps VISTA, whose members help bring individuals and communities out of poverty by serving full-time to fight hunger and illiteracy, improve health services, and increase housing opportunities, and AmeriCorps NCCC (National Civilian Community Corps), a 10month, full time residential program for men and women between the ages of 18 and 24. In exchange for their service, AmeriCorps members earn an education award that can be used to pay for college or to pay back qualified student loans. Since 1994, more than 33,000 Massachusetts residents have served more than 45 million hours and have qualified for Segal AmeriCorps Education Awards totaling more than \$109,400,000.

Senior Corps: More than 5.600 seniors in Massachusetts contribute their time and talents in one of three Senior Corps programs. Foster Grandparents serve one-on-one as tutors and mentors to more than 3,700 young people who have special needs. Senior Companions help more than 1.000 homebound seniors and other adults maintain independence in their own homes. RSVP volunteers conduct safety patrols, renovate homes, protect the environment, tutor and mentor youth, respond to natural disasters, and provide other services through more than 730 groups across Massachusetts.

Social Innovation Fund: The Social Innovation Fund transforms lives and communities using limited federal investment as a catalyst to grow the impact of nonprofits with evidence of strong results. It harnesses the expertise of grantmaking intermediaries engages funding partners to contribute nearly three dollars to every one federal dollar invested. As the Social Innovation Fund network grows programs that work in Massachusetts, more people are able to overcome their most pressing challenges in the areas of economic opportunity, health, and youth development. The Social Innovation Fund is investing more than \$11,000,000 in expanding the impact of 23 nonprofits in Massachusetts, selected and supported by 10 intermediaries.

The Corporation for National and Community Service is a federal agency that improves lives, strengthens communities, and fosters civic engagement through service and volunteering. CNCS engages millions of Americans in service to meet local needs through Senior Corps, AmeriCorps, and national days of service; improves communities through the Social Innovation Fund, and leads volunteer initiatives across the nation. - AmeriCorps National figures may include national programs headquartered in the state and/or operating sites of national programs that are headquartered in other states. Funding reflects the estimated proportionate share of the national grant associated with operating sites in this report. Some national organizations do not report operating site data, or it was not available at time of publishing, so figures may not reflect current conditions.

- As part of its public-private partnership approach, CNCS requires grantees to leverage additional resources to strengthen community impact and increase the return on the federal investment. This figure reflects non-CNCS cash and in-kind resources that CNCS grantees and project sponsors have committed to raise or other revenue used to support their programming activities across the state. Last year, CNCS, its grantees, and project sponsors generated more than \$1.25 billion in outside resources from businesses, foundations, public agencies, and other sources.

Since 1994, more than 33,000 Massachusetts residents have served more than 45 million hours and have qualified for Segal AmeriCorps Education Awards totaling more than \$109,400,000.

National Service Impact in Massachusetts



State Commission

The Massachusetts Service Alliance (MSA) manages a portfolio of 23 AmeriCorps State programs with more than 1,500 AmeriCorps members, addressing critical needs in the areas of education, environment, economic opportunity, disaster, and capacity building. In the 2014-2015 program year, AmeriCorps members in Massachusetts served more than 12,000 youth, including tutoring or mentoring over 7,000 children and providing more than 120 unaccompanied minors representation in court, provided legal service assistance to 1,227 individuals or families, improved 845 acres of parks and public lands and 163 miles of trails and rivers, and provided 1,000 individuals with disaster preparedness education and response/recovery services. In addition, MSA builds the capacity of nonprofits to engage volunteers through trainings and a bi-annual statewide conference on service and volunteerism. MSA administers Commonwealth Corps, a state supported year of service program that engages Massachusetts residents of all ages and backgrounds in direct service and capacity building to rebuild communities, address unmet community needs, and increase volunteerism.

AmeriCorps State

Youth Empowerment AmeriCorps members serve full time at the United Teen Equality Center in Lowell. The center's mission and promise is to ignite and nurture the ambition of Lowell's most disconnected young people to trade violence and poverty for social and economic success. AmeriCorps members serve youth in various capacities, including case management, teaching, coaching, job training, civic engagement, community service and mentoring. AmeriCorps members experience a unique and dynamic opportunity for professional and personal development, and they cultivate a variety of skills from project planning and management to public speaking, relationship building, and more. The United Teen Equality Center recruits AmeriCorps members from the communities served, including former program participants. In 2014-2015, 18 AmeriCorps members gave more than 25,000 hours of service and served than 250 young people, providing them with educational support, civic engagement opportunities, and life skills they need to lead peaceful and empowered lives. In addition, AmeriCorps members collaborated with more than 10 local organizations and leveraged more than 50 volunteers to help in projects at the center and special events.

In 2010, the Mount Grace Land Conservation Trust of Athol established the Massachusetts Land Initiative for Tomorrow (MassLIFT). MassLIFT is a collaborative effort of regional conservation organizations seeking to build public support for land conservation, increase regional conservation capacity, strengthen land stewardship, and provide opportunities for youth to connect with nature and engage in service learning. The overall goal of MassLIFT is to accelerate the pace of land protection across the Commonwealth. Through the program, 23 AmeriCorps members serving at 15 different organizations, helping them meet critical community needs for land protection, including conservation project initiation and implementation, stewardship of protected lands, outreach to the broader community, and service learning opportunities to engage young people in conservation. In 2014-2015, AmeriCorps members recruited and managed 1,492 community volunteers who served 6,821 hours building capacity at 15 different organizations. In addition, 44 organizations reported improved organizational effectiveness resulting from members' capacity building projects.

AmeriCorps National

Citizen Schools is a nonprofit organization that partners with middle schools to expand the learning day for children in low-income communities. Its AmeriCorps members serve at public schools in Boston, Charlestown, Chelsea, Dorchester, Roxbury, and Salem, leading real-world learning projects, providing academic support, and helping all students discover and achieve their dreams. In their two years of service, AmeriCorps members serve as Teaching Fellows, giving students months of extra learning through academic mentoring and skill-building apprenticeships that translate into college readiness and career opportunities. Citizen Schools has been recognized as a leader in engaging volunteers, generating student impact, and balancing direct service with systemic change efforts. Students who are supported by Citizen Schools graduated from high school within four years at a rate of 71 percent, compared to 59 percent among matched peers, and 61 percent of Citizen Schools' alumni enroll in college.

City Year Boston AmeriCorps has 265 members who serve full-time at 21 schools, helping more than 10,000 students with the greatest risk of dropping out. Working side-by-side with teachers, City Year AmeriCorps members work alongside teachers, using research-based tools to improve students' attendance, behavior, and performance in math and English. The members also lead afterschool programs and school-wide initiatives to improve school culture. Thanks to the members' service, 90 percent of students who were tutored in math and 88 percent of students tutored in reading and writing increased their scores on district tests. In a second year of tutoring, an additional 62 percent of students showed gains in English and math test scores, even though the number of AmeriCorps members remained the same.

College Advising Corps has 23 AmeriCorps members serving full-time as college advisors at 24 high schools in Boston. The members are placed in underserved high schools and work to increase the number of low-income, first-generation, and underrepresented students who enter and complete higher education. The members provide the counsel and encouragement that students need to navigate the college admissions process. The AmeriCorps members help students plan their college searches, complete admissions and financial aid applications, and enroll at schools that will serve them well. In 2015, these 23 members served 7,200 students, helping 1,152 seniors register for the SAT or ACT. They held 6,878 one-to-one meetings with students and met with 10,106 students in classroom presentations or group sessions. They also organized college campus visits for 1,004 seniors.

National Service Impact in Massachusetts



FoodCorps has 12 AmeriCorps members serving in Boston, Cambridge, Chelsea, Chicopee, Gloucester, Holyoke, Lawrence, Lowell, and Lynn. FoodCorps is a nationwide team of AmeriCorps leaders who work under the direction of local partner organizations to connect children to real food and help them grow up healthy. They teach children hands-on lessons about food and nutrition build and tend school gardens, teach cooking lessons, and help change what's on lunch trays so that children can eat healthy food from local farms. In the past year, the FoodCorps members in Massachusetts served 8,746 children, built or brought back into use 40 school and community gardens, harvested 1,796 pounds of produce, and recruited 729 community volunteers.

New Sector AmeriCorps members in the AmeriCorps RISE program complete high-impact capacity-building projects for organizations in the Boston area that focus on education and economic opportunity. Their service helps local nonprofits with projects ranging from volunteer engagement to performance measurement and beyond, and allows the nonprofits to create, improve, or expand services to their community. In the past year, 22 New Sector AmeriCorps members completed projects to strengthen organizations that serve more than 10,000 children, 2,000 "opportunity youth," and thousands of low-income residents. The AmeriCorps members participated in up to 200 hours of training, mentorship, and coaching to strengthen their service and help them continue to serve through careers in the social impact sector.

One Youth Mental Health First Aid (YMHFA) Corps AmeriCorps member served this past year at Behavioral Health Network in Springfield. YMHFA is a certification course that introduces participants to risk factors and warning signs of adolescent mental health problems, focuses on the importance of early intervention, and teaches how to help adolescents who are in crisis or having a mental health or substance use challenge. The AmeriCorps member, who is a trained YMHFA instructor, certified 115 community members in the program. A three month follow-up survey revealed that YMHFA strategies helped 416 adolescents who struggle with a mental health challenge or illness.

AmeriCorps VISTA

Vital Village, based out of Boston Medical Center, sponsors two AmeriCorps VISTA members. As a result of their combined efforts, they have formed a residents association and have developed a community survey engagement tool for a food and fitness coalition in an underserved section of Boston. The VISTA members have taken the survey and translated it to mobile technology to increase its sustainability, with the ultimate goal of conducting the survey in other neighborhoods.

Housing Families Inc., in Malden, sponsors two AmeriCorps VISTA members. Their combined efforts have increased the number of new successful grant proposals, developed a system to track lapsed grant sources, improved communication and graphic design, expanded Housing Families' video library, and created videos for specific expansion efforts.

AmeriCorps NCCC

The Community Harvest Project in North Grafton applied for an AmeriCorps NCCC team to help with farming activities and build a 40' x 100' greenhouse that would double existing greenhouse and hoophouse space to grow and harvest plants. The project's mission is to build an engaged and healthier community by bringing volunteers together to grow fresh fruits and vegetables for hunger relief. The NCCC team assembled the greenhouse with minimal instructions. The greenhouse helped the program double their ability to grow — an increase of about 324,000 lbs. Besides the greenhouse work, members did a great deal of farm work: they harvested over 13,487 pounds of fruits and vegetables and washed and prepared over 16,689 pounds of fruits and vegetables. They also painted irrigation pump houses, built transportation stands, maintained the farming garden, and helped with the compost pile. They occasionally instructed drop-in volunteers on how to do some tasks activities when no project staff was available. Thanks to the work of the team, more needy families will get the healthy food they deserve.

An AmeriCorps NCCC team partnered with Mass Audubon, in Sharon, which works to protect the nature of Massachusetts for people and wildlife. The team helped build new program space, renovate camp space, and landscape at Moose Hill Wildlife Sanctuary and at Stony Brook. At Moose Hill, corps members deep cleaned, installed insulation, and removed HVAC metal ventilation and duct work from a building to be used for camp programming. The team built raised garden beds at the CSA Farm and took a damaged roof off the nature center. At Stony Brook, the team expanded a long garden bed, cleared out bird houses and participated in "Amphibians after Dark," an education skit that teaches about frogs, salamanders, and vernal pools. Thanks to the work of the team, there is now more classroom and meeting space at Moose Hill. The garden beds they built serve as a learning opportunity, and protect the farmland from unwanted motorized vehicles. At Stony Brook, the expanded garden helped remove potential hazards, the clearing of bird houses helped bring in new activity, and the skit helps campers learn about amphibians they knew little about.

Senior Corps Foster Grandparent Program

Action for Boston Community Development Foster Grandparent Program volunteers have worked with 17 Somali youth in the Boston area. These youth face many challenges trying to meet the expectations of two very different cultures. The negative portrayal of Somalis in the media, and a lack of role models, can create a sense of disengagement and a lack of investment in their futures as they transition into adulthood. Somali Foster Grandparents build connections with Somali youth in an afterschool program in Roxbury, and provide the students with mentoring and support that they do not get at home. By meeting with Somali youth, engaging in storytelling and discussions about life skills, the Foster Grandparents support youth who have suffered trauma in Somalia. Besides educating them on Somali culture and customs which would otherwise be lost to them, the Foster Grandparents encourage the youth to take control of their identity, develop their leadership skills, and take pride in themselves and their culture.

Senior Corps RSVP

Elder Services of Cape Cod and the Islands RSVP project has 51 volunteers who give approximately 6,500 hours of service each year, helping with environmental projects and other community priorities. The RSVP volunteers, many of whom are veterans themselves, have helped 578 veterans by providing information on how to access State and Federal veteran's benefits, as well as health education and career information.

Senior Corps Senior Companion Program

Valley Opportunity Council Senior Companion Program has 36 volunteers who give in-home support to 179 homebound elders in Chicopee, Ludlow, and Holyoke. This support and assistance helps the elders continue to live independently. The volunteers help with transportation, socialization, wellness, and application assistance.

Social Innovation Fund

The Social Innovation Fund (SIF) is investing \$3,533,998 to expand the impact of 22 nonprofits in Massachusetts. In 2015, the SIF more than doubled the number of nonprofits working in Massachusetts that it supports. These nonprofits work on a variety of issues, including working to improve healthy living, fostering youth development and increasing economic opportunity throughout the state. People who are being served by a SIF subgrantee, AIDS Action Committee of Massachusetts, who had a detectable HIV viral load have shown an 81 percent decrease in their viral load after a six-month follow-up check. The SIF transforms lives by using evidence to find what works and make it work for more people. The SIF Classic and SIF Pay for Success programs harness the expertise of grant-making intermediaries to identify, evaluate and expand effective nonprofits serving low-income communities.

Volunteer Generation Fund

The Massachusetts Service Alliance has continued to expand the Service Enterprise Initiative across Massachusetts by working closely with Volunteer Connector partners in Southeastern Massachusetts (United Way of Greater New Bedford), Cape Cod (Cape and Islands United Way), and most recently in Boston (Boston Cares). This evidence-based training and certification program has served as an ideal way for MSA to help build internal capacity for agencies of all sizes across Massachusetts and providing in-depth and individualized support. The curriculum allows MSA to offer best practices for the use of skill-based volunteers and expanding volunteerism within each participating agency. Each year MSA works with 10-15 new agencies to undergo the Service Enterprise transformation which culminates with a national certification and a portfolio of implemented best practices. In addition, MSA provides opportunities for nonprofits to introduce and recruit new volunteers to their agency through National Days of Service. MSA works with 20-30 agencies to host service projects to engage at least 21,000 community volunteers serving up to 42,000 hours across the Commonwealth.

Through a \$6 million investment, Jobs for the Future and its partner, the Aspen Forum for Community Solutions, seeks to improve education and career outcomes for youth disconnected from school or work, also known as Opportunity Youth, in 7 communities across the country. The expectation is that participating youth will earn a diploma or its equivalent and enter postsecondary education at twice the rate of peers who do not receive these services.

The National Fund for Workforce Solutions (NFWS) is expanding its innovative approaches to job training and career support in various communities. The selected subgrantees represent the implementation of the NFWS's and its partner, Jobs for the Future, Social Innovation Fund grant award. The approach of the National Fund is distinguished by a strong focus on two customers: the employee and the employer. New Profit Inc. is supporting six subgrantees to scale and evaluate their programs nation-wide through their SIF-invested Pathways Fund. Focused on youth ages 12 to 24, the goal of the Pathways Fund is to: increase high school graduation and GED attainment, increase college enrollment, increase college credit accumulation rates, and achieve living wage employment.

The Partnership will provide Transaction Structuring technical assistance to between 4-5 Service Recipients, resulting in the launch of new Pay for Success projects in the Western United States. The Partnership builds on key strengths of each individual partner involved in the Pay for Success field: Social Finance, Inc. as an experienced intermediary and project coordinator dedicated to mobilizing capital to drive social progress; and the Sorenson Impact Center as an innovation mission-focused institute with broad experience in overall outcomes-oriented projects and stakeholder management. The Center also brings unparalleled access to research academics to support the refinement of intervention programs and related evaluation designs. The Partnership will take a proactive and comprehensive approach to help jurisdictions structure PFS projects, focusing technical assistance on development of: 1) program designs that incorporate research-based principles of effective intervention; 2) social cost benefit models to articulate the economic value proposition for the intervention; 3) rigorous evaluation designs; and 4) quantifiable outcome metrics to approximate overall impact for the planned intervention. Finally, the Partnership will assist organizations with the development of a communication and engagement strategy to support a stakeholder engagement, including providers, funders, and policymakers.

A grant of \$2.7 million for one year will allow the Boston Foundation to implement Boston Coaching for Completion, an effort designed to raise post-secondary completion rates, especially for the most vulnerable youth populations in the Boston area.

Description

The Stanford Center on Poverty and Inequality (CPI) and Third Sector Capital Partners ("Third Sector") have joined together for the Social Innovation Fund's Pay for Success Administrative Data Pilot. The proposed program will improve the quality of the evidence used to evaluate PFS initiatives. Although administrative data are the gold standard for many types of program evaluation, they have not been well incorporated into the PFS movement because providers cannot easily access administrative data or do not have the expertise to analyze them. We address these problems by combining the CPI's strength in accessing and analyzing administrative data in California and Oregon with the Third Sector's familiarity with the 20 ongoing and planned PFS projects in those states. We propose to focus initially on projects addressing economic opportunity because the CPI has substantial contacts and resources in that focus area and because there are a large number of ongoing PFS projects within it. The program described here (a) delivers a well-publicized competition for government and provider Service Recipients, (b) selects promising PFS projects that will benefit from administrative data, (c) ensures that the many hurdles in accessing administrative data are overcome in a timely way, (d)provides ongoing technical assistance to the Service Recipients, and (e) builds a training program and resource center that will allow PFS initiatives to incorporate administrative data successfully. The proposal is supported by a one-to-one \$1.5M nonfederal cash match of requested CNCS funds.

Third Sector Capital Partners is leveraging SIF funding to assess the feasibility of implementing Pay for Success (PFS) projects at the local and state level, including exploration of multi-government-level (local, state, federal) contracting and financing for outcomes-driven services.

It has a breadth of assets: strong and extensive physician relationships through Baycare Health Partners (BHP), a physician hospital organization and accountable care organization that represents more than 1,400 physicians; Health New England, a managed care organization and subsidiary of Baystate; Pioneer Valley Accountable Care a subsidiary of BHP; and four independently-led Neighborhood Community Health Centers (one of which is a pediatric practice) totaling 144,000 visits per year.

PVAC's Pay for Success partners include Revitalize CDC, Springfield Partners for Community Action and HAP Housing. PVAC is convened by Partners for a Healthier Community.
Boston, MA	College Advising Corps GreenLight Fund	With its subgrant to College Advising Corps (CAC), GreenLight's SIF Initiative is supporting CAC's work to increase the number of low-income, first-generation, underrepresented students entering and completing higher education. To accomplish this goal in Boston, CAC recruits, hires and intensively trains recent Boston-area college graduates to serve as college advisers in high-need high schools to help students navigate the college admissions process, secure financial aid, and enroll in college. CAC advisers are from similar backgrounds to the students they serve. By the 2017-2018 academic year, CAC expects to serve all BPS high schools.
Newton, MA	Blueprint Schools Network GreenLight Fund	With its subgrant to Blueprint Schools Network (Blueprint), GreenLight's SIF Initiative is supporting Blueprint's work with the Boston Public Schools (BPS) to implement its research-based, innovative turnaround model in schools designated as underperforming. Through this work, Blueprint will reach over 1,000 students annually over five years in Boston. Blueprint partners with school districts to improve outcomes for students in their lowest-performing schools, through a "deep change" turnaround process. Blueprint focuses on five research-based strategies identified as the biggest drivers of student achievement in highly-effective, gapnarrowing public charter schools: (1) excellence in leadership and instruction; (2) daily tutoring in critical growth years; (3) increased instructional time; (4) a culture of high expectations; and (5) use of data from frequent assessments to improve instruction.

Boston Private Industry Council Jobs for the Future (2015) OYIF The Boston Opportunity Youth Collaborative (OYC), convened by the Boston Opportunity Agenda and the Boston Private Industry Council, is addressing a gap in services for older opportunity youth in Boston who have a high school credential, but have not taken the next steps to college or career. The OYC has launched a Connection Center where these young people can get started on their education and career pathways. Through Opportunity Works, Boston is implementing a postsecondary and career bridging strategy that offers these youth, 40 percent of whom are boys and men of color, supported transitions from the Connection Center into postsecondary education and training. Navigation coaches transition these young adults to and through postsecondary education and training, and ultimately, to the start of a career. This effort aligns with and builds upon a citywide campaign to help all Boston youth transition successfully to postsecondary education—allowing this campaign to reach a far more challenged population. The Boston collective impact collaborative has selected four high-performing partner programs to provide the postsecondary and career bridging, along with navigation supports; it also has MOUs with nine other programs that have agreed to both refer to and accept referrals from the Connection Center. Boston has multiple strategies to achieve scale, including launching a collectively shared data tracking strategy, systemic changes to increase student support and connections at the community colleges, and expanding the number of programs that are using the Back on Track model. JVS Bridges to College and Careers (JBCC) prepares low-income, low-

JVS Bridges to College and Careers (JBCC) prepares low-income, low-skilled individuals in the Greater Boston area for entrance to and completion of industry-recognized college credentials linked to high-demand jobs with strong career ladders. With support from LISC, JVS will strengthen its highly-successful Biotechnology and Compliance Pathway in partnership with Quincy College, while expanding a current focus area in Information Technology into a separate STEM pathway program in Computer Networking. JVS will deepen integrated service delivery in JBCC by expanding Financial Opportunity Center services to more individuals, will increase program accessibility by addressing academic skills gaps in pre-bridge programs, and will accelerate college readiness by co-enrolling adult diploma students nearing completion of their high school credential.

The Roxbury Center for Financial Empowerment will expand its integrated services model to include a Hospitality Bridge to Career opportunity program. This program will help to move current Roxbury clients into financially stable, unionized jobs within the hospitality field. Roxbury will work closely with partners to connect clients to the Hotel Workers Union — the largest hospitality empower in the City of Boston. Roxbury currently provides integrated services delivery to over 150 people per year and the BCO program will allow them to provide additional training and employment opportunities to these clients.

YouthBuild is partnering with colleges to support at-risk youth, helping them apply, enroll, and complete two and four year degrees.

Roca combines relentless outreach with data-driven evaluation to produce consistent, positive outcomes for young people in the Greater Boston area, including the communities of Chelsea, Revere, Everett, Boston, and East Boston, as well as Springfield, Massachusetts. Roca's Transitional Employment Program provides young people with the opportunity to learn how to hold and succeed in a job, and helps disrupt the cycle of poverty and incarceration
Lowell, MA	UTEC Inc. REDF (2015)	UTEC, founded in 1999 and based in Lowell, was the result of an organizing movement driven by young people to develop their own teen center in response to gang violence. Social enterprise employment in UTEC Mattress Recycling, UTEC Food Services, and UTEC Woodworking is the cornerstone of UTEC's staged, long-term approach to serving proven-risk young people. For all youth served, UTEC measures success through three key outcome areas: Reduced Recidivism, Increased Employability, and Increased Educational Attainment. Today, nationally recognized as a model agency, UTEC's mission and promise is to ignite and nurture the ambition of proven-risk youth to trade violence and poverty for social and economic success.
Waltham, MA	More Than Words REDF (2015)	Since 2004, More Than Words has been employing and empowering youth who are in foster care, court involved, homeless, or out of school to work in and run a used book store and café business in the Boston area. In addition to retail storefronts, More Than Words operates ecommerce bookstores and employs youth in the book warehouse. More Than Words empowers youth to take charge of their lives by taking charge of a business, with a special emphasis on reconnecting youth to education by supporting GED attainment, enrollment in community college, and identification of long-term career goals. They believe that when system-involved youth are challenged with authentic and increasing responsibilities in a business setting, and are given high expectations and a culture of support, they can and will address personal barriers to success, create concrete action plans for their lives, and become contributing members of society.
Allston, MA	West End House The Boston Foundation	WEH will coach 60 new students per year, at Mass Bay Community College and other colleges. Anticipated Outcomes include: 85% year-to-year college persistence rate; 75% of students with a GPA of 2.0 or higher; 75% of students on track (credit accumulation) to graduate from college within 6 years.
Boston, MA	Boston Private Industry Council The Boston Foundation	The PIC proposed to serve 185 new students in year one at Bunker Hill Community College, Roxbury Community College, and Benjamin Franklin Institute of Technology, including 20 student transfers to UMass Boston. In their first year of SIF they continued to support 70 members of the BPS Class of 2014 students. In year two, the PIC plans on serving 205 SIF students.

Boston, MA	Match Beyond The Boston Foundation	Match Beyond will work with 100 students per year for three years with BosC4C support; in five years, they anticipate working with 550 students annually. Outcomes include: 80% of Match Beyond students complete their targeted CFA-SNHU degree; 95% persistence (reenrollment) rates from year one to two for Cohort 1 (Class of 2015).
Boston, MA	Steppingstone The Boston Foundation	Steppingstone proposes to serve an annual caseload of 80 students graduating from Boston public high schools, delivering a deepened coaching model based on Success Boston's transition coaching. The three BosC4C coaching cohorts will inform Steppingstone's future and expanded pipeline of middle school students now progressing through College Success Academy.
