MEETING COMMUNITY NEEDS IN OKLAHOMA

More than 6,900 people of all ages and backgrounds are helping to meet local needs, strengthen communities, and increase civic engagement through national service in Oklahoma. Serving at more than 1,200 locations throughout the state, these citizens tutor and mentor children, support veterans and military families, provide health services, restore the environment, respond to disasters, increase economic opportunity, and recruit and manage volunteers.

This year, the Corporation for National and Community Service (CNCS) will commit more than \$14,720,000 to support Oklahoma communities through national service and social innovation initiatives. CNCS invests in cost-effective community solutions--working hand in hand with local partners to improve lives, expand economic opportunity, and engage citizens in solving problems in their communities. Serving in many of the state's most impoverished communities, CNCS provides vital support to schools, food banks, homeless shelters, community health clinics, youth centers, veterans service facilities, and other nonprofit and faith-based organizations at a time of growing demand for services. Through a unique public-private partnership, this federal investment will leverage an additional \$19,460,000 in other resources to strengthen community impact, build local support, and increase return on taxpayer dollars. Nationwide, CNCS, its grantees, and project sponsors generated more than \$1.25 billion in outside resources from businesses, foundations, public agencies, and other sources in FY 2015.

AmeriCorps: This year AmeriCorps will provide more than 960 individuals the opportunity to provide intensive, results-driven service to meet education, environmental, health, economic, and other pressing needs in communities across Oklahoma. Most AmeriCorps grant funding goes to the Oklahoma AmeriCorps , which in turn awards grants to nonprofit groups to respond to local needs. Most of the remainder of the grant funding is distributed by CNCS directly to multi-state and national organizations through a competitive grants process. Other individuals serve through AmeriCorps VISTA, whose members help bring individuals and communities out of poverty by serving full-time to fight hunger and illiteracy, improve health services, and increase housing opportunities, and AmeriCorps NCCC (National Civilian Community Corps), a 10-month, full time residential program for men and women between the ages of 18 and 24. In exchange for their service, AmeriCorps members earn an education award that can be used to pay for college or to pay back qualified student loans. Since 1994, more than 12,000 Oklahoma residents have served more than 14 million hours and have qualified for Segal AmeriCorps Education Awards totaling more than \$29,620,000.

Senior Corps: More than 5,900 seniors in Oklahoma contribute their time and talents in one of three Senior Corps programs. Foster Grandparents serve one-on-one as tutors and mentors to more than 1,500 young people who have special needs. Senior Companions help more than 340 homebound seniors and other adults maintain independence in their own homes. RSVP volunteers conduct safety patrols, renovate homes, protect the environment, tutor and mentor youth, respond to natural disasters, and provide other services through more than 1,000 groups across Oklahoma.

Social Innovation Fund: The Social Innovation Fund transforms lives and communities using limited federal investment as a catalyst to grow the impact of nonprofits with evidence of strong results. It harnesses the expertise of grantmaking intermediaries to identify, evaluate and expand effective nonprofits and engages funding partners to contribute nearly three dollars to every one federal dollar invested. As the Social Innovation Fund network grows programs that work in Oklahoma, more people are able to overcome their most pressing challenges in the areas of economic opportunity, health, and youth development. The Social Innovation Fund is investing more than \$51,000 in expanding the impact of 1 nonprofit in Oklahoma.

The Corporation for National and Community Service is a federal agency that improves lives, strengthens communities, and fosters civic engagement through service and volunteering. CNCS engages millions of Americans in service to meet local needs through Senior Corps, AmeriCorps, and national days of service; improves communities through the Social Innovation Fund, and leads volunteer initiatives across the nation. - As part of its public-private partnership approach, CNCS requires grantees to leverage additional resources to strengthen community impact and increase the return on the federal investment. This figure reflects non-CNCS cash and in-kind resources that CNCS grantees and project sponsors have committed to raise or other revenue used to support their programming activities across the state. Last year, CNCS, its grantees, and project sponsors generated more than \$1.25 billion in outside resources from businesses, foundations, public agencies, and other sources.

State Commission

The Oklahoma Community Service Commission currently administers 11 AmeriCorps programs varying from intensive tutoring, mentoring, and teaching in Title One schools and community-based organizations to poverty alleviation through economic opportunity and food security programs. For the 2015-16 program year, 830 AmeriCorps members are serving throughout Oklahoma in 39 school districts and more than 45 nonprofit and community organizations state-wide, for a budget total of \$3,163,461. Another \$1 million is being leveraged locally each year in additional matching cash and in-kind support. Since 1994, more than 11,000 Oklahomans of all ages and backgrounds have provided more than 12 million hours of service addressing critical challenges and earning more than 24.4 million in education awards for their service.

AmeriCorps State

Each year, The Oklahoma In Action AmeriCorps program engages 45-50 AmeriCorps members in the fight against poverty. The goal of the program is to increase services available to low-income families and adults. Partner agencies work to promote food security, employment and education opportunities, housing access, legal services, and other direct services. AmeriCorps members provide GED tutoring, English as a Second Language tutoring, job readiness training, job placement, food pantry management, nutrition education, client in-take, and volunteer recruitment and management. More than 26,000 low-income families received services through the Oklahoma In Action program in 2015.

Each year, Project Transformation places 50 AmeriCorps members at summer day camps for low-income children, ages 5-12, in high poverty neighborhoods at eight locations throughout Bartlesville, Mangum, Muskogee, Oklahoma City, and Tulsa. The six hour-a-day program incorporates an individual reading and mentoring component that provides each child with a one-on-one literacy mentor in addition to educational enrichment opportunities through science, math, computer science, arts, and recreation; while providing college-age students a service learning experience and giving a local community a model of neighborhood transformation, dynamic community resources, and infused vitality.

AmeriCorps National

City Year Tulsa AmeriCorps has 50 AmeriCorps members who serve full-time at six schools, helping more than 3,130 students at greatest risk of dropping out. AmeriCorps members work alongside teachers, using research-based tools to improve students' attendance, behavior, and performance in math and English. The members also lead afterschool programs and school-wide initiatives to improve school culture. In 2014-2015 at Clinton Middle School, every student in 7th and 8th grade finished both semesters with passing grades in mathematics. At Webster High School, the graduation rate increased 20 percent.

AmeriCorps VISTA

The Regional Food Bank of Oklahoma is the largest private hunger-relief charity in the state, providing enough to feed more than 116,000 hungry Oklahomans every week, 37 percent of whom are children. AmeriCorps VISTA members helped establish the Regional Food Bank in 1979 and have helped set the foundation for the organization's continued success. During 2015, Regional Food Bank distributed 49.9 million pounds of food through a network of 1,250 charitable feeding programs and schools throughout 53 central and western Oklahoma counties. The 48 AmeriCorps VISTA members assigned to the project work to build the long-term sustainability of anti-poverty and anti-hunger programs through statewide collaborative efforts that will provide service to under-resourced individuals and families. Summer Associate members assigned to the project provided summer feeding activities to 6,467 children at 93 sites, an increase of 1,753 children and 20 sites from the previous year.

Southeast Oklahoma Interlocal Cooperative (SOIC) is a local education agency accredited by the Oklahoma State Department of Education that has served numerous counties since its inception 40 years ago. SOIC currently has 48 schools on contract to provide special education therapy services and/or parent educator services. The 34 AmeriCorps VISTA members assigned to the SOIC project provide capacity-building services to schools and partner organizations including hospitals, chambers of commerce, and nonprofit community organizations in 17 southeast Oklahoma counties, including McCurtain County - designated as one of the top five most difficult places to reside in the United States. AmeriCorps VISTA members have recruited 723 community volunteers that contributed 13,430 hours of service. In addition, members have leveraged \$334,110 in donations to SOIC's schools and partner organizations.



AmeriCorps NCCC

During the summer of 2015, an AmeriCorps NCCC team was requested by the American Red Cross in Oklahoma City to assist in tornado and flood relief efforts in the central Oklahoma area. The team served with multiple departments within the relief operation, including Damage Assessment, Logistics, and Casework. In their time serving on the project, members created 33 maps and six emergency shelter trailers, made more than 200 calls to clients, and supported several of the organization's data systems. Since the recovery efforts were still in their early phases, many Oklahomans were still in need of immediate relief. AmeriCorps NCCC members served 16 Oklahoma counties in a number of ways by providing relief supplies, including food, water, and clean-up materials. The team also helped to set up emergency shelters to provide disaster survivors access to shelter, food, water, and emotional support.

Central Oklahoma Habitat for Humanity (COHFH) provides housing to low-income families using volunteer labor and donations. Families purchase homes through no-profit, no-interest mortgage loans, or through innovative financing methods. AmeriCorps NCCC members were trained to lead volunteer groups alongside site supervisors. AmeriCorps NCCC members served on 13 different build sites at various stages in the construction process during their six-week spike. They framed six houses, decked five roofs, and installed soffits, cornices, and fascia at five houses. They also painted exteriors at three houses, interiors at two houses and final detail work at five houses. The team also assisted with critical home repair projects on two additional houses, including weatherization and the tear down and rebuilding of a deck.

Senior Corps Foster Grandparent Program

Delta Community Action Foundation, Inc. is a nonprofit organized for the purpose of executing, coordinating, and planning programs to alleviate and attempt to eradicate poverty in Garvin, McClain, and Stephens counties in Oklahoma. Two area shelters serve approximately 314 children and youth annually. Foster Grandparent volunteers with Delta Community Action provide assistance to children who are at risk due to neglect, abuse, abandonment or are in need of basic supervision. Many children come from homes where one or both parents are incarcerated. Shelter youth also include juvenile offenders as well as youth who may be at risk of delinquency. The calming influence and supportive relationship of the Foster Grandparent Program volunteers is a very important and positive service to the residents. In total, Delta Community Action's Foster Grandparent Program supports 70 volunteers that provided services to 245 children.

Senior Corps RSVP

RSVP of Enid and North Central Oklahoma's mission is to bridge the gap between those who need and those who give. The program empowers veterans to lead high-quality lives with respect and dignity by ensuring that veterans and their families can access the full range of benefits available to them. RSVP volunteers served more than 5,000 hours of service to Disabled American Veterans (DAV) last year. The DAV utilized their mobile command unit to help search and rescue for Moore tornado victims. While Moore was not in the project's service area, volunteers were committed to this issue and helped raise over \$1.2 million dollars in claims for the affected veterans.

Senior Corps Senior Companion Program

For 40 years, Sunbeam Family Services' Senior Companion Program has made positive impacts in the Oklahoma City area by providing companionship and respite services for isolated, homebound seniors. Over the last program year, only one client entered nursing home care out of 385 served. Every time a client avoids nursing home placement, the financial impact is an approximate community savings of \$48,000 annually. Caregiver clients, who receive respite services, and companion clients tend to be low-income individuals who would not be able to keep their loved ones at home without this free service. By Senior Companions providing 8-16 hours of service a week, seniors in need receive compassionate care in their own homes, which impacts the community through reduction of nursing home costs.

Description

CSH and its partners will work with the Oklahoma Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services (ODMHSAS) to assess the feasibility of a PFS initiative focused on creating supportive housing for young adults (18-25) with mental health, substance use, or cooccurring disorders who are without stable housing, have experienced homelessness or chronic homelessness. ODMHSAS will head the PFS team—leaders from the Oklahoma Department of Human Services, Oklahoma Office of Juvenile Affairs, Homeless Alliance, and Mental Health Association Oklahoma and their partners -- in a collaborative effort (Oklahoma's Two Cities: One Mission) to align necessary resources for the state to move forward to end homelessness among young adults transitioning out of foster care and/or the juvenile justice system, and for those young homeless persons with mental health, substance use, or co-occurring disorders who are without stable housing, have experienced homelessness or chronic homelessness. Among other technical assistance, CSH anticipates working with ODMHSAS to develop methods that: a) clearly define the target population using existing data and identifies the subset in need of supportive housing; b) creates a supportive housing model and plan that will meet the needs of the targeted youth. This project will target Oklahoma City located in Oklahoma County and the City of Tulsa located in Tulsa County.
